Dear Ed,

The product ALGAE-X has proven itself a winner on my vessel and at least one other that I am familiar with.

My woes began one and a half years ago when I took on fuel in Sanibel and emptied their filling tanks. Since then, I have gone through at least twenty sets of Racor filters. I had to disassemble the Racor and clean the centrifuge numerous times. I tried fuel treatments including Biobor and Soltron. The fuel had to be emptied from the tank, polished and the tank cleaned.

All of these actions and costs still did not overcome the fact that after running a conservative 1950 rpm on our 692 Detroit's for an hour or two, the engines would begin to slow. Black smoke would appear and I would have to either pull back the throttles or change filters. Even our flow scans would plug. Needless to say, I looked foolish to some since I care for almost 30 vessels. The amount of time spent cleaning the transom was enough to kill some of our fun.

The good news is that since I installed ALGAE-X and used the chemical additive, I have just completed a 500-mile trip without once cleaning the transom or having any evidence of a fuel problem. Those who regularly travel with us noticed the difference. Now our vessel is a real joy.


I installed the ALGAE-X units in less than an hour. They are mounted right on top of the fuel tank. Our 45 Viking Sport Fish makes this easy.

The other vessel that I know the history of is a 61 Hattaras Motor Yacht with 1271 Detroit's. The story is almost the same. The owner tried all of the same things that I did, and finally he went to ALGAE-X. He was very pleased with the chemical treatment and it ended all of his woes.

I was very skeptical of using a magnetic device, but I must tell you, I am a believer now and so are many of my travel mates.
